


Dockray - The Dodds are wide, expansive fells at the northern end of one of the Lake District's longest ridges. Taking advantage of a relatively lofty start west of the village of Dockray, grassy ridges with far-reaching views are the order of the day on this 10½-mile (with 2532ft of ascent) **BLACK** walk to the north-west of Ullswater. Great Dodd [2813ft], Watson's Dodd [2589ft], Stybarrow Dodd [2767ft], White Stones [2609ft] and Hart Side are not difficult hills in themselves but climbed together they make for a reasonably hard day out on the fells. Even when dropping down from the high tops there are even more Lakeland glories to be enjoyed with superb views of Glencoyne and Ullswater.





An alternate 6½-mile **RED** linear walk (with 1115ft of ascent) from Dockray to Glenridding via Glencoyne Head is also on offer (if the summit of Sheffield Pike is visited, the ascent is increased to 1509ft).
